IN THE EYE OF THE STORM — REBUILDING JUSTICE AMIDST PAKISTAN'S DEEPENING INEQUALITY



Pakistan finds itself in a pivotal moment fraught with the threat of external conflict in the region, regression and hope. While the country's overall standing remains dire, with a 148 out of 148 ranking in the World Economic Forum's Global Gender Gap Index, recent progress has legislative illuminated a flicker of possibility. The National Assembly's unanimous passage of the Child Marriage Restraint Bill for Islamabad (banning marriage under the age of 18) significant is a milestone in the fight to protect children's rights align with global and commitments such as SDG 5: Gender Equality. It's a shift welcome in a landscape where progress has long felt elusive.

Yet one progressive law in the capital does not erase the stark realities faced by millions across the provinces. Gender-based violence remains rampant, child abuse cases are escalating, and systemic barriers continue to deny justice to those most in need. These are the daily realities in which the Legal Aid Society operates and which became even more daunting following the

sudden suspension of international donor funding earlier this year.

This funding crisis was more than financial; it was existential. With 80% of our programming disrupted almost overnight, we were forced confront to an uncomfortable truth: our mission deliver justice to cannot rely on aid alone. And so, LAS began its most ambitious transformation yet. We are reengineering our financial model to build longterm resilience and missionindependence. aligned Between April and June, this pivot took meaningful shape:

- We launched the Justice Champions Initiative, mobilizing diaspora communities from Seattle to Toronto to Dubai. This effort seeks to turn global solidarity into sustainable giving for access to justice.
- We expanded our corporate training programs offering targeted modules on compliance, workplace safety, and digital rights. These trainings don't just serve corporates; they fund our frontline work for survivors.
- We initiated deeper engagement with CSR partners and foundations, positioning legal empowerment as a key lever in ESG strategies and corporate accountability.
- We pioneered Al-driven for training modules lawyers and judaes; marking a first-of-its-kind initiative in Pakistan. These modules aim to equip legal professionals with the skills navigate rapidly to a evolving legal-tech

• landscape and to apply emerging technologies ethically and effectively within justice systems.

And behind the scenes, we continue to lay the groundwork for more bold innovations designed to protect our work from political financial and volatility while scaling impact through innovation.

Our on-the-ground impact continues to drive this mission forward. Between April and June:

- [XYZ] callers reached out to our SLACC helpline, seeking guidance on everything from domestic abuse to civil rights.
- 36 clients were represented in courts across Pakistan-women, children, and marginalized individuals whose cases might otherwise have gone unheard.

We are, in every way, rebuilding the future of justice —not just for today, but for generations to come.

At a time when systems falter and silence reigns, LAS remains a voice, a shield, and a force for equity. We are not just surviving this storm we are reshaping it into a new dawn for justice in Pakistan and are grateful to you for your support.

EMPOWERING CITIZENS AT THE FOREFRONT OF CRISES THROUGH ITS TOLL-FREE NUMBER 0800-70806 – A PUBLIC-PRIVATE PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN THE GOVERNMENT OF SINDH AND THE LEGAL AID SOCIETY

The Sindh Legal Advisory Call Center (SLACC) is a flagship project of the Legal Aid Society (LAS) and the Government of Sindh (GoS). SLACC is Pakistan's first and one-of-a-kind tollfree helpline, which through its Interactive Voice Recording (IVR) system has amassed an impressive record of 518,270 calls received, encompassing a diverse range of 297,088 queries registered from more than 600 cities across Pakistan. These queries are appropriately addressed by High Court enrolled Agent Lawyers and Callers are provided conclusive guidance.

During this last quarter, SLACC registered 14,817 queries. This quarter's statistics reveal that 80.4% of queries originated from male callers, while 19.8% came from female callers, with an additional 6 calls from gender non-conforming individuals. The majority of calls originated from Sindh (68%), followed by Punjab (28%), Balochistan (1%), and Khyber Pakhtunkhwa (1%).

These calls were categorized based on different areas of law, with the following breakdown: Civil Law (3,903 queries), Criminal Law (1,092 queries), Public Service Matters (739 queries), and General Information (1,731 queries).



Pakistan's first multilingual free legal advisory Chatbot-NAZ Assist

Launched publicly on October 1st, NAZ Assist—the free, multi-lingual legal advisory chatbot—has already supported 7000+ users.

Together, SLACC and NAZ Assist continue to demonstrate how techenabled solutions can bridge the justice gap for communities across Pakistan.



PUBLIC AWARENESS AND MARKETING EFFORTS

After achieving positive results, SLACC continued its marketing efforts during the reporting quarter as part of its comprehensive Mar-Comms (Marketing-Communications) campaign. SLACC lawyers and team members remained highly active in the media landscape this quarter amplifying legal awareness through television and radio platforms across Sindh. From April to June 2025, SLACC participated in a total of 19 television appearances and 5 radio shows, offering expert legal guidance on topics including domestic violence, inheritance, property disputes, family law, guardianship, child labor, NADRA succession procedures, building control regulations, and more.

To strengthen public recognition and expand outreach, SLACC launched a strategic bus branding campaign across Karachi, Sukkur, and Hyderabad this quarter. A total of six 40-foot buses were fully wrapped with SLACC visuals, aimed at building brand recall and promoting legal awareness among daily commuters.

SLACC launched a targeted billboard campaign at Karachi's busy intersections, Gurumandir Chowk and Anda Mor, for one month to promote free legal advice awareness. This strategy maximized visibility among daily commuters and effectively reinforced SLACC's message of accessible justice for underserved urban populations.

SCHOOL OUTREACH IN COLLABORATION WITH ZINDAGI TRUST



As part of its child-focused legal literacy initiative, SLACC; in partnership with Zindagi Trust; conducted a series of legal awareness sessions across five government schools in Karachi during May 2025. Led by Advocate Sher Hussain, the sessions were held at SMB Fatima Jinnah Government Girls School (19th & 20th May), Khatoon-e-Pakistan Government Girls School (21st & 22nd May), and DHACSS Neelum Campus (26th May). These interactive engagements educated students on critical legal protections, including Child Protection, Harassment and Abuse, Child Labor, and Child Marriage. The initiative aimed to build awareness, promote student safety, and empower young individuals to recognize and seek help through appropriate legal avenues. The sessions were met with active participation and positive feedback, reinforcing the value of early legal education.

Refresher Training on Disability Sensitization



As part of its capacity-building efforts, SLACC held a Refresher Training on Disability Sensitization with NOWPDP. The session aimed to enhance of disability rights legal understanding and frameworks in Sindh, and introduced NOWPDP's programs for persons with disabilities (PWDs). Interactive activities encouraged reflection on barriers by PWDs and promoted inclusive legal faced training emphasized SLACC's assistance. This commitment to accessible justice and inclusive support for all.

Al Integration Milestone: Successful Speech-to-Text Demo at SLACC

SLACC This quarter, demonstrated a breakthrough in speech-totext AI for calls, effectively transcribing legal queries in real time and tagging case types. This innovation streamlines processes, enhances documentation, accelerates query analysis, and improves research outputs and M&E systems for future planning.

Internal Legal Capacity Building: Corporate and IPO Laws Training



To enhance legal expertise, SLACC held an internal training session on Corporate Laws and Intellectual Property (IPO) Laws, led by Advocate Faheem Shah. The session covered company formation, shareholder rights, corporate governance, and trademark/copyright registration. Participants engaged in scenario-based learning to apply these laws practically. This initiative reflects SLACC's continuous commitment to professional development, ensuring its lawyers can meet the evolving needs of the public, including entrepreneurs and innovators.

Policy Brief and Project Report Disseminated to Key Stakeholders

SLACC's new policy brief, "Facilitating Women's Access to Property Rights through Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR)," reveals critical insights. Only 11% of Pakistani women hold legal property believing highlighting titles, despite 33% otherwise, misinformation. A survey of 731 women in Sindh shows 59% face mobility restrictions and 65% require permission to leave home, complicating legal recourse. From 2018-2023, SLACC handled over 22,000 property-related inquiries, with 49% of male callers seeking help for female relatives, indicating limited legal access for women. Notably, 73% of women favor non-litigation methods like mediation. SLACC advocates for women-focused ADR, supported by legal reforms and trained mediators, to ensure justice is accessible and gender-sensitive.



GLOBAL SPOTLIGHT ON ACCESS TO JUSTICE

WHAT HAPPENED AT TED...DIDN'T STAY AT TED

Our CEO recently returned from TED 2025 in Vancouver — an energizing second-time experience filled with bold ideas and global conversations. This year, the spotlight was on AI, with thought-provoking talks by leaders like Eric Schmidt and Sam Altman. While the pace of innovation is breathtaking, the regulatory lag is deeply concerning. Amidst the awe, our CEO left with what she calls "desperate optimism" — a belief in the quiet power of daily service. From climate action to justice reform, TED reminded us that ordinary people everywhere are solving extraordinary problems. The mission remains: show up, stay rooted, and keep building.



SCALES OF JUSTICE TIPPED IN OUR FAVOR



We're proud to share that the Legal Aid Society has received the 2025 Community Champion Award from Street Law, Inc. at their annual gala in Washington, D.C. This recognition means the world to us it highlights our journey to institutionalize Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) Pakistan. Through across meaningful partnerships, especially with Street Law, we've trained law students and faculty in mediation to make justice more accessible. As our CEO Haya Zahid said while accepting the award, this honor affirms our belief that justice must be immediate, inclusive, and rooted in community needs.

JUSTICE KNOWS NO BORDER

On May 1st, CEO Haya Zahid joined a special conversation in Washington, DC, hosted by Namati and the Grassroots Justice Network. She highlighted LAS's groundbreaking work — from Pakistan's first prison paralegal program to an Al legal advice chatbot built on insights from over 500,000 helpline calls.

Amid stories of resilience and funding challenges, the message was clear: innovation and determination remain central to expanding access to justice in Pakistan and beyond.





STRENGTHENING THE GOVERNMENT'S RESPONSE TO SEXUAL VIOLENCE IN PAKISTAN

NATIONAL CONFERENCE ON SURVIVOR-CENTERED APPROACHES



On 16 April 2025, LAS and partners hosted a National Learning & Sharing Conference in Islamabad, bringing together stakeholders from the criminal justice system, civil society, and donor agencies. The dialogue focused on strengthening implementation of the Anti-Rape Act, improving forensic protocols, addressing technology-facilitated GBV, and enhancing survivor-centered coordination. Provincial best practices, especially from Sindh, were shared as reform models.

ADVOCACY FOR ANTI-RAPE LAW IMPLEMENTATION IN BALOCHISTAN



From 29–30 May 2025, LAS and UNFPA held high-level advocacy meetings with key stakeholders in Balochistan including the Additional Secretary (Health), Special Secretary (Home), Secretary (Women Development), and Additional IG Police to strengthen implementation of the Anti-Rape (Investigation and Trial) Act, 2021. Discussions focused on operationalizing Anti-Rape Crisis Cells (ARCCs), Special Sexual Offences Investigation Units (SSOIUs), and introducing the Balochistan Sexual Violence Response Framework (BSVRF). Stakeholders showed strong interest in interdepartmental coordination and joint training to advance survivorcentered justice.

MULTI-SECTORAL TRAINING ON GBV & ANTI-RAPE PROTOCOLS IN KP



From 27–29 May 2025, LAS, in collaboration with UNFPA and the Khyber Pakhtunkhwa Judicial Academy, conducted a three-day training for police, medico-legal officers, and prosecutors. The sessions addressed investigation, medico-legal, and prosecutorial protocols under the Anti-Rape Act, fostering cross-sector collaboration to improve justice delivery in GBV cases amidst critically low conviction rates.

STRENGTHENING SGBV RESPONSE THROUGH TECHNICAL WORKING GROUPS – SINDH

In collaboration with the Sindh Government's Multi-Sectoral Coordination Committee (MSCC), LAS is advancing key reforms to combat sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV). Two consultations with 30 government officials identified major gaps including untrained investigation officers, weak intercoordination, and limited agency enforcement. Recommendations focused on operationalizing SSOIUs, district-level rollout, centralized GBV data systems, and survivorone-stop protection centered centers underscoring Sindh's commitment to traumainformed, coordinated justice.



MULTI-SECTORAL TRAINING SESSION IN SINDH

Between May and June 2025, the Society (LAS), in Legal Aid partnership with the Sindh Judicial Academy and UNFPA, held four powerful training sessions in Karachi and Hyderabad on the Anti-Rape (Investigation and Trial) Act, 2021. multi-sectoral These joint, trainings brought together 87 key stakeholders, Medico-Legal Officers, Prosecutors, and Police Officials-to break silos and build a coordinated, survivor-centered response to sexual violence. Led by experts Mr. Naveed Ahmed Soomro and Dr. Summaiya Syed, sessions blended legal the insights with hands-on medicolegal demonstrations, offering practical tools for evidence collection, ethical examinations, and managing sensitive cases. With an average post-training knowledge gain of over 17%, the sessions not only deepened understanding of the Anti-Rape Act and its 2022 Rules but also fostered inter-agency collaboration, laying the foundation for a stronger, more responsive justice system in Sindh.

LEGAL TRAINING FOR NIKKAH REGISTRARS AND UC OFFICIALS



On 16 June in Mirpurkhas and Umerkot, nikkah khuwans, registrars, and Union Council officials received training on enforcing Sindh's law against child marriage. The session emphasized their critical role in preventing underage marriages and positioned them as frontline enforcers of child protection laws.

TRAINING FOR PEACE: EQUIPPING SINDH'S FRONTLINE MEDIATORS

As part of our ongoing commitment to sustainable peace in Sindh, the Legal Aid Society — in collaboration with A4ID conducted one-day training sessions for District Peace Committee (DPC) members across Hyderabad, Dadu, Sanghar, and Sukkur. These sessions focused on equipping members with practical tools in conflict resolution, stakeholder engagement, and early warning mechanisms.

The initiative prioritized inclusivity, ensuring the active participation of women, religious minorities, and differently-abled individuals. Prominent religious scholars and civil society representatives also joined the sessions, reinforcing a community-driven approach to peacebuilding.

By fostering local leadership and strengthening grassroots networks, we aim to prevent conflict, promote social harmony, and build a more just and peaceful Sindh.





FCDO REPRESENTATIVE VISITS ANTI-RAPE CRISIS CELL TO OBSERVE SURVIVOR-CENTERED RESPONSE

FCDO representatives visited the Anti-Rape Crisis Cell at Jinnah Postgraduate Medical Centre to observe the multi-sectoral model providing survivor-centered medicolegal, psychological, and legal support.

Established through efforts by LAS, UNFPA, and partners, the ARCC reflects a continued commitment to strengthening institutional responses to sexual violence.

STRENGTHENING MULTISECTORAL COORDINATION UNDER THE ANTI-RAPE ACT

The Legal Aid Society, in collaboration with UNFPA Pakistan, the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), and UK Aid, conducted two-day multisectoral trainings at the Sindh Judicial Academy, Karachi. Two batches of criminal justice sector actors participated in these sessions, aimed at enhancing coordination in the implementation of the Anti-Rape Act, 2021.

Through interactive discussions and crosssector engagement, the trainings focused on building a shared understanding of roles, responsibilities, and best practices to ensure survivor-centered justice.

These trainings mark another step toward a more responsive, collaborative justice system in Pakistan.



UNITING VOICES TO END CHILD MARRIAGE

The Legal Aid Society, in collaboration with UNFPA Pakistan, the Foreign, Commonwealth and Development Office (FCDO), and UK Aid, hosted a high-level consultation on child marriage aimed at developing a unified provincial narrative to challenge the social and religious norms sustaining this harmful practice.

Bringing together government officials, civil society organizations, youth leaders, religious scholars, and lawmakers, the session focused on actionable strategies to protect children's rights and eliminate child marriage in Pakistan.

The message was clear: collective action is key to safeguarding the future of our children.



STAGES OF CHANGE: THEATRE AGAINST CHILD MARRIAGE

In collaboration with Tehrik-e-Niswan, the Legal Aid Society brought to life a powerful theatre performance that told the story of a young girl forced into marriage as soon as she reached puberty. Through raw emotion and unflinching storytelling, the play laid bare the devastating physical, emotional, and psychological toll of child marriage.

But the message didn't end with the curtain call. Community members were trained to carry the conversation forward – transforming awareness into grassroots action.

Because no child should have to trade her dreams for a tradition.

ACCESS TO JUSTICE THROUGH MEDIATION: A LANDMARK PARTNERSHIP

In a significant stride toward institutionalizing mediation in Pakistan, the Legal Aid Society and MICADR have signed an MoU with the Centre for Effective Dispute Resolution (CEDR), a global leader in mediation training and services.

The signing ceremony, graced by Acting Chief Justice of Pakistan Hon. Justice Syed Mansoor Ali Shah, underscored the enduring importance of emotional intelligence in dispute resolution — even in an Al-driven era. He emphasized the partnership's potential to strengthen mediation training, policy frameworks, and a more accessible justice system.

CEDR CEO James South and Principal Consultant Andy Rogers commended LAS and MICADR for championing mediation in the Global South, reaffirming their long-term commitment to the region. Justice Arif Hussain Khilji, Shahzar Ilahi, and Sarha Rasheed represented MICADR at the event.

This milestone marks a decisive move toward making mediation the first – not last – resort for justice in Pakistan.



QUIET CHAMPIONS OF JUSTICE: AN IMPACTFUL PARTNERSHIP WITH ISMAIL GLOBAL

Global

In the World Economic Forum's 2025 Gender Parity Report, Pakistan ranks 148 out of 148 countries. With a gender parity score of just 56.7% and only 22.8% economic participation by women, the figures reflect a deeply entrenched inequality. Yet, behind every statistic lies a human story—one that deserves dignity, protection, and justice. In October 2024, the Legal Aid Society and Ismail Global launched a joint initiative to confront one of Pakistan's most critical human rights challenges: access to justice for survivors of sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV).

Over nine months, this partnership offered free legal representation in over 230 SGBV related cases including domestic violence, rape, child custody, abduction, harassment, and maintenance issues that are often sidelined within the justice system. The results are telling: While these numbers underscore the legal impact, the real success of this partnership lies in the quiet yet powerful stories of women and children who reclaimed their agency through justice. Together, LAS and Ismail Global continue to reaffirm a simple truth: justice is not a privilege—it is a right.



IGNITING LEARNING WITH ATTOCK REFINERY

This quarter, the Legal Aid Society launched its corporate training session with Attock Refinery, led by expert facilitator Mr. Shahzar Illahi. Focused on The Fundamentals of Negotiation, the session provided participants with essential tools for effective crisis management skills, team development, and leadership growth.



DRIVING CHANGE WITH LUCKY CEMENT, KARACHI



In Karachi, we conducted a multi-level training series with Cement, addressina Luckv Gender Sensitization and Harassment Workplace tiers of the across all organization. Led by expert facilitators Ms. Maliha Zia Lari and Ms. Arham Sarwar, the sessions engaged everyone from frontline staff to senior management.

The training focused on unpacking biases, fostering respectful workplace culture, and building awareness of employee rights and responsibilities.

With practical tools and open dialogue, teams were equipped to contribute to safer, more inclusive work environments.

The response from participants was resounding: this training is not just relevant — it's essential.

AI IN LAW: TRAINING THE NEXT GENERATION

The Legal Aid Society held a two-day training for 15 legal professionals on using Al in contract drafting, research, and litigation—while staying ethically aligned. Each participant built a

custom Legal AI Assistant to streamline workflows and reduce research time, marking a leap toward smarter, tech-enabled legal practice.

LAUNCHING THE CHUNRI BAJI READER PROGRAM WITH GOREAD.PK



In partnership with Go Read PK, we've launched the Chunri Baji Reader Program — a powerful initiative where women prisoners step into the role of storytellers for children living in prison.

As Chunri Bajis, these women read carefully selected stories that nurture empathy, confidence, and character in young minds. In doing so, they also find healing, purpose, and a renewed sense of self within the prison environment. Because even behind bars, stories can spark transformation — one reader, one child, one chapter at a time.

CHAMPIONING JUSTICE FOR MARGINALIZED COMMUNITIES THROUGH STRATEGIC LITIGATION – A DEDICATED EFFORT BY THE LEGAL AID SOCIETY'S TEAM OF HUMAN RIGHTS LAWYERS

At the heart of the Legal Aid Society's mission lies its Litigation Department—a relentless team of human rights lawyers who stand as the last line of defense for Pakistan's most marginalized communities.

Since 2019, this dedicated unit has filed over 2,000 cases, achieving an extraordinary 82% success rate. Today, the team is managing over 400 active cases across 22 district courts in Sindh, covering critical issues such as sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), women's rights, Muslim Family Law, and broader human rights violations.

But these aren't just numbers. Behind every case is a survivor whose story could have ended in silence—if not for the unwavering support of advocates who believe justice should never depend on one's means.



In this quarter, the department's efforts translated into tangible outcomes and milestones, as reflected in the following success stories:

"I fought for eight years. LAS got it done in one hearing."

Shaheen won her case for maintenance in 2012, but for 8 years, she saw nothing. Frustrated by a broken system, she nearly gave up. One salary slip changed everything. With legal representation, **SHE FINALLY SECURED HER RIGHTFUL PAYMENTS IN JUST ONE HEARING.**

"Sisters are asked to let go of their inheritance rights, but for brothers, this is never a question."

For three years, Musalma battled for her rightful inheritancelosing time, family, and peace. She was expected to surrender what was hers. But she refused. **THIS YEAR, SHE WON!**
