ACCESS TO JUSTICE

Access to Justice at LAS

e are committed to making legal support fair, accessible and equitable for all. Our Access to Justice Portfolio empowers people with knowledge of their rights, provides direct legal aid, and pushes for the adoption of Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) to ease the burden on courts. By reducing barriers, we aim to build a more inclusive legal system, in line with SDGs 10 and 16.

Our work has four key areas of focus:

Legal Aid for all

We provide critical legal representation to underserved communities, helping them assert their rights and gain access to justice.

Know Your Rights

Through outreach and awareness campaigns, we empower individuals to navigate the legal system confidently by equipping them with the knowledge of their rights





Impactful Litigation

Our expert litigators take on precedent-setting cases, fighting against discriminatory practices and defending the rights of marginalized communities.

ADR

We champion Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) methods like mediation and community-based solutions to offer quicker, more accessible paths to justice outside traditional courts.

Pathways to Action - Access to Justice



Equipping Communities with Legal Literacy

Through our Community Legal Aid and Awareness Clinics, we bring crucial legal knowledge to the doorsteps of those who need it most. We've reached community members, focusing on women, religious minorities, and the economically disadvantaged, ensuring they understand their rights and how to seek help when they need it.

IMPACT

Over 53,000 community members reached through Community Legal Aid and Awareness Clinics.



Creation of Community Paralegals

LAS has a network of paralegals: men, women, and transgender individuals - who serve as trusted legal guides in their neighborhoods. These paralegals help to resolve local disputes, advocate for marginalized groups, and become powerful voices for justice. Their training also helps build leadership skills, enabling them to become advocates for change.

IMPACT

700+ paralegals trained and mobilized



Leveraging Digital Media

We know that legal problems can be overwhelming, but at LAS, we're here to help. Our legal aid services focus on protecting economic, social, and cultural rights by providing expert legal advice, representation in court, and support with administrative processes. We offer targeted support ensuring that legal assistance is accessible to all.

IMPACT

Legal aid services have reached over **56 million people** through SMS and social media.

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Specialized Legal Advice

Our Sindh Legal Aid Advisory Call Center (SLACC) is a lifeline for those seeking answers. Supported by a dedicated team of over 30 high-court enrolled lawyers, we provide timely, accurate, and practical legal advice on a wide range of issues from criminal law to property disputes helping thousands find clarity and support when it matters most.

IMPACT

A team of over **30 high-court enrolled lawyers** provides specialized legal advice.



Institutionalizing ADR

We believe in finding peaceful solutions to conflicts. Our Musaliha International Center for Arbitration & Dispute Resolution (MICADR) is at the forefront of promoting Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR), helping communities settle disputes without going to court. We are committed to easing court congestion and providing faster resolutions to those in need.

IMPACT

Over 2,900 cases resolved through ADR, with more than **450 justice actors trained** in mediation.



Shaping the Future of Justice

We're building the future of justice by engaging with law schools to integrate ADR into their curriculum. By training faculty and students, we're preparing the next generation of lawyers to embrace mediation and ADR, ensuring faster, more inclusive justice for all. Five major law schools have already adopted our sessions, bringing ADR education into the heart of legal training.

IMPACT

GENDER AND CHILD SECURITY

The Reality of Women and Children in Pakistan

Gender and Child Security at LAS

t LAS, we are deeply committed to addressing the injustices faced by women and children. Our Gender and Child Security Portfolio focuses on combating sexual and gender-based violence (SGBV), protecting children, empowering women economically, and securing their rights within marriage. We challenge deeply ingrained patriarchal norms and strive for gender equality, advancing Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 3 and 5.

Our work centers around three key areas:

Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV)

Prevention and response to SGBV with a specific focus on sexual violence, domestic violence, and forced conversions through marriage.

We know that delays and inefficiencies in the justice system often leave SGBV survivors waiting for justice that never comes. That's why we've developed our Think-Trial Approach—a comprehensive strategy that identifies and addresses the gaps and obstacles at every stage of the legal process, from the moment an incident occurs to the trial's conclusion. By targeting these bottlenecks, we are working to increase conviction rates and ensure justice is served swiftly and fairly.

Economic Empowerment of Women & Children

Advancing women's rights to acquire, access, and control property while advocating for recognition of marital property rights. Simultaneously, providing basic literacy and vocational training to juveniles to reduce recidivism and foster rehabilitation.

Protection of Women & Girls in the Family

Educates women about their rights under all personal laws, with a special focus on progressive and non-patriarchal interpretations of Muslim Family Laws.

Pathways to Action - Gender and Child Security



Facing the challenges of SGBV together

Legal literacy helps women recognize and challenge Sexual and Gender-Based Violence (SGBV), equipping them with knowledge of their rights and redressal mechanisms. This empowerment fosters stronger community networks that prevent and address SGBV.

IMPACT

25% increase in SGBV cases being reported and pursued in our target districts shows how empowerment leads to action.



Empowering Girls and Women for a brighter future

Through our workshops on literacy,financialindependence, and leadership, LAS helps girls and women not only respond to violence but build economic resilience and take control of their futures.

IMPACT

Over 3,000 girls and women trained on critical life skills that they need to thrive.



Bridging educational gaps for Juveniles

Through LAS's basic literacy program at Central Jail Karachi, we provide vital education to juveniles, many of whom have never attended school or madrasa. By equipping them with essential literacy skills, we want to offer a pathway to a better future.

IMPACT

Over 1,900 juveniles armed with skills aimed at reducing recidivism and empowering them for reintegration into society.



Building capacity to combat SGBV

LAS provides gender sensitization and legal training for law enforcement, judicial officers, and government institutions, ensuring a more compassionate and effective response to SGBV.

IMPACT

Over 2,000 criminal justice officials trained to improve their handling of SGBV cases, along with sensitizing 150+ Nikkah Khuwans (Marriage Registrars).



Driving Policy and Legal Reform

LAS plays a key role in legislative reforms addressing domestic violence, child marriage, dowry, and women's property rights. Our efforts have contributed to key legislative reforms that strengthen protections for survivors of sexual violence across Pakistan.

IMPACT

We've supported the drafting of the Sindh Medico-Legal Act (2023), the Anti-Rape Act (2021), and draft laws to secure women's rights to marital property.



Research and Evidence-based Advocacy

Our evidence-based approach fuels all our programs and advocacy efforts. From child marriage to women's property rights, our research informs real change and strengthens the legal protections available to women and children.

IMPACT

12 research studies and
3 policy papers published, leading to meaningful policy reforms.



Support to Government efforts to tackle SGBV

As a key facilitator for the Government's Sexual and Gender-Based Violence Coordination Committees, LAS plays a vital role in technical working groups focused on SGBV data and Sexual Offences Investigation Units.

IMPACT

We developed the **Sexual Violence Response Framework** for Sindh and Islamabad, and **launched 2 Anti-Rape Crisis** Cells in Islamabad and Karachi.



Fighting for justice through Strategic Litigation

Through strategic litigation in sexual abuse and rape cases, we collaborate closely with public prosecutors to ensure survivor-centered legal processes that deliver justice.

IMPACT

40% increase in successful SGBV prosecutions, which shows that our litigation efforts are making a real difference.

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Freedom of Religious Belief at LAS

At LAS we stand with religious minority communities (RMCs) to protect their rights, strengthen their legal knowledge, and promote Ainclusion. Through focused legal interventions, strategic litigation, and community-building, we work to shield RMCs from forced conversions, discrimination, and violence. Through our Freedom of Religious Belief Portfolio, we're committed to creating a Pakistan where religious minorities can live their faith freely and seek justice without fear, aligning with Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 10 and 16.

LAS is working hard to ensure freedom of religion and belief (FORB) is woven into every aspect of our work. Our efforts focus on five key areas:

Exposing Bias and Discrimination

We shine a light on the prejudice faced by religious minorities in society, courts, and administration, using evidence-based research to drive change.

Legal Process Enhancement

We work to enhance legal processes and build the capacity of justice actors to ensure religious minorities receive fair trials and equitable access to justice.



Fighting Forced Conversion

We raise awareness about the issue of forced conversions, especially through marriage, and advocate for stronger responses from the government, justice systems, and civil society to protect vulnerable women and girls.

Reforming Personal Laws

We're pushing for updates to personal laws for religious minorities to ensure they have the same legal protections as everyone else.

Prevention of discrimination & violence

At the district level, we're building mechanisms to promote tolerance social cohesion, and prevent violence against religious minority communities.

Pathways to Action - Freedom of Religious Belief



Safeguarding the Rights of Religious Minority Communities (RMCs):

LAS has empowered RMCs through legal aid and awareness sessions, which equip them with the knowledge to identify and combat discrimination, forced conversions, and religious persecution, enabling them to better navigate the legal system and seek justice.

IMPACT

Over 24,615 individuals empowered through legal aid and awareness sessions.



Capacity Building in Justice and Administrative Systems

IMPACT

Research and Data Driven Interventions

LAS prioritizes primary data generation to fill critical gaps on RMC issues, ensuring interventionsareevidence-based.Research efforts include legal needs assessments, studies on forced conversions, property rights, and unconscious biases in the justice system.

IMPACT

7 comprehensive research reports published to date.



Fostering Peace and Inclusion

In partnership with the Government of Sindh, LAS has played a pivotal role in establishing 10 District Peace Committees (DPCs) with both male and female RMC representation. These committees foster open dialogue and help prevent violence through capacity-building in communication, negotiation, and conflict resolution, promoting peace and tolerance at the community level.

IMPACT

10 active District Peace Committees bringing communities together.



Legal Aid and Support for RMCs

In the past three years, LAS has resolved cases for RMC individuals, providing legal advice, document preparation, and mediation services. By assisting individuals in accessing reserved quotas and legal entitlements, we ensure RMCs can claim their rights and protect themselves from discrimination.

IMPACT

504 cases resolved, ensuring access to justice for RMCs.



Strategic Litigation and Law Reform

LAS uses strategic litigation to fight discriminatory practices and set legal precedents that protect RMCs, especially in personal law matters. We also advocate for critical reforms in marriage and inheritance laws, including draft legislation addressing forced marriages, child marriages, and inheritance rights for RMCs.

IMPACT

10+ legal precedents in the pipeline, reshaping the legal landscape for RMCs.



CLIMATE RESILIENCE, SUSTAINABILITY, AND SECURITY

Pakistan is the 5th most vulnerable country to Climate Change

Devastating Monsoon Impact In the summer of 2022, Pakistan faced severe monsoon rains, nearly three times the 30-year national average, submerging one-third of the

country and affecting over

33 million people. With more than 80 districts declared 'calamity hit,' including 23 in Sindh, countless families were left displaced and struggling to survive.

Loss of Identity, Loss of Support As the floods ravaged communities,

nearly 89% of those affected lost crucial identification documents, cutting them off from essential support systems like the Benazir Income Support Programme (BISP) and other social security schemes. Without these documents, families were left without a lifeline in their most desperate hour.

Climate Resilience, Sustainability, and Security at LAS

t the Legal Aid Society (LAS), we're committed to supporting communities most affected by climate disasters, focusing on legal empowerment and ensuring access to essential social protections. For those without proper documentation, the aftermath of a disaster can be devastating. That's why we step in - offering legal assistance and connecting people with the state-sponsored relief mechanisms they urgently need. Our work aligns with Sustainable Development Goals (SDG) 1 and 13, driving resilience, recovery, and social protection where it's needed most.

We focus on three key areas:

Reclaiming Identity

When floods and other disasters strip people of their vital documents, their access to aid disappears, too. We help individuals recover critical ID cards, birth certificates, and more, so they can rebuild their lives and access the relief they deserve.

Unlocking Social Protections

We ensure that those impacted by climate disasters know their rights and have the support to access social security programs. By guiding them through the system, we make sure they receive the financial aid and resources needed for recovery.



Emergency Relief & Financial Aid

Partnering with local stakeholders, we deliver emergency relief—like ration drives and financial aid—while also focusing on long-term recovery. Our goal is to help communities not just survive climate disasters but emerge stronger and more prepared for future challenges.

Pathways to Action - Climate Resilience



Reclaiming Identity for Flood-Affected Populations

In the wake of devastating floods, LAS carried out an in-depth study across five districts in Sindh to understand the urgent civil documentation needs of affected communities. Many families lost their essential papers - like ID cards and birth certificates - leaving them without access to vital services.

IMPACT

1,204 beneficiaries assisted.



Bringing Legal Help to the Heart of Communities

Through mobile legal clinics and grassroots awareness sessions, LAS has reached flood-affected individuals directly, helping them restore access to legal documents lost in the disaster. From CNICs to birth certificates, we're reconnecting people with their rights and the services they depend on.

IMPACT

300 awareness sessions were held, reaching over 9,700 community members.



Legal Awareness

To make the recovery process easier, LAS developed four easy-to-understand Information, Education, and Communication (IEC) materials that guide flood survivors through the steps to regain their documents. These materials have empowered thousands to navigate the legal system and reclaim their identity.

IMPACT

4 different IEC materials were distributed, benefiting thousands of beneficiaries

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Hands-on Legal Support

As part of our recovery efforts, LAS provided personalized consultation sessions and financial assistance to those in need. This hands-on support has enabled flood-affected individuals to regain their legal identity and access vital services.

IMPACT

Over 1,900 consultation sessions were conducted, **900+ individuals served**, and 500+ provided with financial aid.



Building Long-Term Resilience Together

LAS' work on civil documentation recovery is making a real impact during the early recovery phase. Together, we're strengthening response systems and creating lasting solutions to help communities bounce back stronger.

Champions of Change: The Faces and Forces behind LAS



Our Founder & Chairperson

ustice Nasir Aslam Zahid is a trailblazer in Pakistan's legal landscape, whose legacy spans decades of service, reform, and advocacy for the marginalized. Earning his B.A. Honors in Law from Cambridge University in 1956 and being called to the Bar at Middle Temple in London the same year, Justice Zahid's pursuit of justice began with academic excellence. He later completed his M.A. at Cambridge in 1960, before returning to Pakistan to practice law for over two decades.

In 1980, Justice Zahid was appointed as a judge of the Sindh High Court, marking the start of a judicial career defined by bold leadership and groundbreaking decisions. As Chief Justice of the Sindh High Court (1992-1994), he championed public interest litigation and authored landmark judgments that fortified fundamental freedoms. His commitment to justice led to his elevation to the Supreme Court of Pakistan in 1996, where he continued to leave a profound impact on Pakistan's legal system.

A visionary beyond the bench, Justice Zahid was instrumental in leading the Commission of Inquiry for Women (1996-1997), a pivotal initiative addressing women's rights. His forward-thinking approach to judicial modernization saw him spearhead the Supreme Court's computerization project, and he led the Federal Judicial Academy from 1999 to 2000. His refusal to compromise on constitutional principles was cemented when he chose not to take an oath under the Provisional Constitutional Order (PCO) in 2000, marking his departure from the judiciary.

Justice Zahid's commitment to social justice extended well beyond his judicial career. After retiring, he founded the Hamdard School of Law in Karachi, creating a new pathway for legal education in Pakistan. As the Chairperson of the Committee for the Welfare of Prisoners (2004-2024), Justice Zahid transformed it into a pioneering legal aid institution, providing free representation to thousands of underprivileged prisoners. His two decades of leadership in this role built a lasting system of support for those often forgotten by society.

A champion of Alternative Dispute Resolution, Gender Justice, and Public Administrative Law, Justice Zahid's influence extends not just within Pakistan but internationally, where he contributed to constitutional reform committees in various countries. His vision of a more equitable and accessible justice system continues to inspire legal reforms and empower communities across the country.
